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ADVISING INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Spring 2023 Enrollment Requirements

On May 31, 2022, The Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP)reissued its guidance for the 2022-23 academic year and has clarified international student enrollment requirements.

International students who were actively enrolled at a U.S. school prior to March 9, 2020 and have continuously complied with the terms of their nonimmigrant status can temporarily engage in courses that are all online or a combination of online and hybrid/face-to-face to complete their full course of study during the 2022-23 academic year.

International Students admitted and enrolled after March 9, 2020 (beginning the summer 2020 semester), can only enroll in <u>ONE online class</u> toward their full course of study each semester during the spring and fall semester. If a student needs only one course to complete the program of study, the course cannot be online. Please refer to the <u>FAOs</u> for additional information.

STEM OPT Extension

As international students complete their programs, most are eligible to apply for a one-year work authorization experience called Optional Practical Training. Students who graduate with a science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) degree are eligible to remain in the United States for an additional 24 months on an optional practical training (OPT) STEM extension.

The 24-month STEM OPT Extension allows international students in F-1 status who receive a bachelor's, master's or doctoral degree in an approved STEM field to apply for a 24-month extension of their standard 12-month Post-OPT period, twice in a lifetime. Employment must be with an <u>E-verify</u> employer. Past Fall 2022 Events





VISITING SCHOLAR SPOTLIGHT

Wei Cui China

What are you working on at SIUE, and what were you doing before beginning your program?

I am a visiting scholar in the Department of Educational Leadership. I am studying under Prof. Yuliang Liu. I am preparing for this study abroad to work in the areas of online teaching research and information technology and curriculum integration related to foreign languages in universities. While I was in China, I taught at Changsha University of Science and Technology and studied for my PhD in Curriculum and Pedagogy at Hunan Normal University. My research focuses on information technology and curriculum integration for teacher competency enhancement and teaching model optimization.



Why were you interested in SIUE, and what are your goals for the future?

In order to acquire new information and broader perspectives, I applied for a program supported by the China Scholarship Council (CSC). After a rigid academia evaluation process organized by CSC, I have been awarded a scholarship under the State Scholarship Fund to pursue study in the United States of America as a visiting Scholar.

I hope to improve blended/online teaching methods and models by drawing on foreign experience, thus, to achieve the desired goal of improving teaching efficiency and effectiveness.

What is something that surprised you about SIUE, Edwardsville, or the U.S.?

After coming here, I found numerous things that attracted me, such as the colorful and beautiful campus, the well-equipped buildings, the wonderful activities, the super enthusiastic students, and, most surprisingly, the faculty. I've had so much help from the teachers here. My mentor Prof. Liu is a really nice person. He provides me with the latest news and activities on campus every day! When I first arrived here, I had some trouble on renting an apartment because of cultural differences, and the teachers who got the situation tried to give me as many options as possible, and finally Amy from ISSS stepped in and helped me out so that I had the ideal place to stay. Later, I wanted to apply for a course and took the liberty of emailing the instructor of that course I wanted to sit in on, and she turned me down because the course had formed a community and foundational knowledge in the middle of the semester and suggested I take the course later. I thought that was all there was to it, but no! Three hours later, I got another email from her with a list of classes available to me! Such examples abound in my life in SIUE. Because of such patient and dedicated teachers, SIUE is home.

Host a Visiting International Scholar

Visiting international scholars are usually researchers or professors in their home countries who come to collaborate on research or teaching programs with SIUE departments. They may be hired as employees of SIUE or they may be visitors representing their universities abroad in a professional capacity for meetings at SIUE. Most international scholars are invited to SIUE as Exchange Visitors (J–1 Visa), Temporary Workers in a Specialty Position (H–1B Visa) or Tourists (B–1 Visa for Business Purposes). International Affairs helps facilitate visits for scholars on J–1 Visas.

The Exchange Visitor Program is made possible by the U.S. Department of State. SIUE typically hosts approximately five to ten J-1 visiting international scholars at any given time, in several different departments. Global Zone

On October 12, SIUE's first ever Global Zone International Student Ally training was conducted for nearly 60 faculty and staff participants. The purpose of this new training is to equip members of the campus community with the tools they need to best support international students. Participants are made aware of differences between U.S. and international student university experiences and provided with opportunities to hear international student perspectives. The training was developed as a response to the growing international student population and grounded in the results of a survey answered by over 250 students, a student focus group, and student interviews. The training development team was comprised of staff members from the Office of International Affairs, Graduate and International Admissions, and the Intensive English Pathway Program. The next Global Zone training will take place on November 28.

What's in a Name: Conventions and Origins of Names from China, India, and Nigeria **Diversity Day**
